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# Peoria Feed & Grain: The Early Days (Part 2)

Continuing the story, Jake Vander Molen and Mel Deur were excited to see a new business opportunity opening up in the Peoria area following their decision to haul in bagged feed from Waterloo and have Otto Vos sell it for them. Farmers were asking for more. They wanted a complete feed for their animals—a mixture of corn, hay, protein, and molasses, and they wanted it delivered, ready to go.

The three men met to talk it over and decided the best plan for success centered around separating the feed business from the Peoria Stockyards. For starters, Otto would go to a

bank in Pella to see if he could borrow \$20,000 to buy a portable grinder that could mix two ton of feed and add molasses. If successful, Otto would launch a brand new business in Peoria. The Pella banker turned him down. Undaunted, Otto went to Taintor Savings Bank in New Sharon and repeated his request. Mr Pothoven, the banker there, considered Otto's request thoughtfully. "Do you think it will work?" he asked.

Otto replied, "You bet or I wouldn't have asked!" "Then lets go for it," said Mr Pothoven. It was 1956 and that was the start of Peoria Farm Milling.

At first Otto's son Stan took care of their farm while Otto ran the new business. Later the land was rented to local farmer Marion Vander Linden and Stan joined his father in meeting the needs of a growing list of customers. By

1960 the business had grown enough that a second portable grinder was added to the fleet. Otto and his youngest son Melvin ran the old portable while Stan, and full time employee Gene Roose, operated the new one.

Meeting customer needs was top priority and a broken down truck was definitely hard on the bottom line, so Otto did everything he could to ensure one and prevent the other. A second gas engine was purchased for the old portable since,

because of its age and the extreme demands of the grinder, its engine required overhauls regularly. The three Rus brothers, mechanics in Pella, were indispensible in keeping Otto and his team on the road. They would over haul the spare engine and have it ready to go. When a broken down grinder was hauled to their shop they would remove the engine, replace it overnight with the spare, and have it all ready to go out the next morning. Then they would start overhauling the removed engine, continuing the cycle. (Part 3 in next issue)

# Lower Grove Park—an Oasis in Iowa

Nestled in a quiet, private corner of Richland Township, Lower Grove Park is a small oasis that goes back more than 30 years. When asked where it is, curators Nancy and Clarence Spoelstra tell visitors to turn south onto 155th St. just off the east end of the Skunk River bridge, drive through the river bottom, and then watch for signs pointing the way.

"It was a gathering place started by Paul Vander Hart on land that used to be a farmstead," shares Nancy. "He wanted to create an environment for getting together with his neighbors and family, just like his father had years before."

"We adopted Paul's vision 27 years ago," adds Clarence, "and keeping this place in great shape is a big part of it."

The clean and modern park has several electrical outlets for up to 10 campers and tents. It offers a pavilion for cookouts and gatherings, a fire ring for smores and conversation, bathrooms, and a serene setting providing a view of Iowa's gentle sloping fields. Scouting organizations, church and youth groups, and families searching for peace and quiet, use the campsite frequently. According to

Nancy, they get several campers per week. "It varies," she says, "with heat keeping some people away, but overall, we've been having good attendance lately."

It costs \$8 a night to camp. The fee helps cover the costs of upkeep, maintenance and insurance for such a friendly facility.

The Spoelstras also host Harvest Days at the park in the fall. Usually held the 3<sup>rd</sup> weekend in September, the event centers around the old fashioned art of sorghum making. It's another continuation of a tradition started by Paul who even wrote a book recalling his memories of sorghum making and the camaraderie of a neighborhood.

sorghum largely by hand. They begin by harvesting the sorghum from the field with corn knives and then feeding the stalks through a mule-powered or a tractor-powered press to squeeze out the sugar laden juices. Those are then purified by slow-boiling them over a fire. The process is the same as it was done from the turn of the century. The State Food Inspector has dictated a few changes, but the final product is all natural with no additives or preservatives.

Along with sorghum making, the event features rope making, jack-o-lantern designing and other activities for the family. It starts mid morning and runs until evening. "We serve a pancake breakfast so you can taste the sorghum," says Nancy. "It's the best with butter on hot cornbread."

So save a little time this summer to camp out under a cool breeze or stop in this fall to get a rich taste of sorghum and nourishment from a neighborhood oasis. For more information on the park or Spoelstra's sorghum, call them at 628-3934. They'll be happy to answer all your questions.

this fiscal year. His plan for the fiscal year 2007 would be to recycle and repave highway T-33 in conjunction with highway G5T from the Peoria corner to the Skunk River bridge. Doing the two roads together would make the whole project more cost effective.

"That brings up a classic question: What to do with the road through Peoria?" asks Jerry. He thinks it is important to address the situation practically and responsibly. As with all civic projects, funding and the timing of that funding is always crucial.

There are plans in place for Manaats Construction to edge drain and stabilize G5T from a half mile east of the Peoria 'T' towards New Sharon. It's Jerry's wish to have the company confirm the dates to complete the task this fall. So, be prepared for some stop-and-go traffic in the near future.
